

Under the guidance of Margaret Lawler Waterman, a group of University of Michigan women graduates established the Waterman Alumnae Group in the fall of 1953. Nineteen years later the Waterman Town Hall Series came into being, as the group's main fundraiser. Then, at the beginning of this century, another milestone resulted with the formation of the Waterman Endowment, which has added additional financial assistance and has helped to secure Waterman scholarships for University of Michigan students forever.



Since its inception Waterman has awarded three hundred forty three (343) scholarships to need-based, deserving students.



Colin Woodard is an award-winning author and journalist whose books include *American Nations: A History of The Eleven Rival Regional Cultures of North America* (named one of the Best Books of 2011 by The New Republic and The Globalist, and winner of the Maine Literary Award for Non-Fiction), and *The Republic of Pirates: Being The True and Surprising Story of the Caribbean Pirates and the Man Who Brought Them Down*, a New York Times bestseller. A longtime foreign correspondent, he reported from more than 50 foreign countries and seven continents for the San Francisco Chronicle, The Christian Science Monitor, and The Chronicle of Higher Education before joining the staff of the Portland Press Herald and Maine Sunday Telegram, where he was winner of the 2012 George Polk Award, and was a finalist for the 2016 Pulitzer Prize for Explanatory Reporting.




